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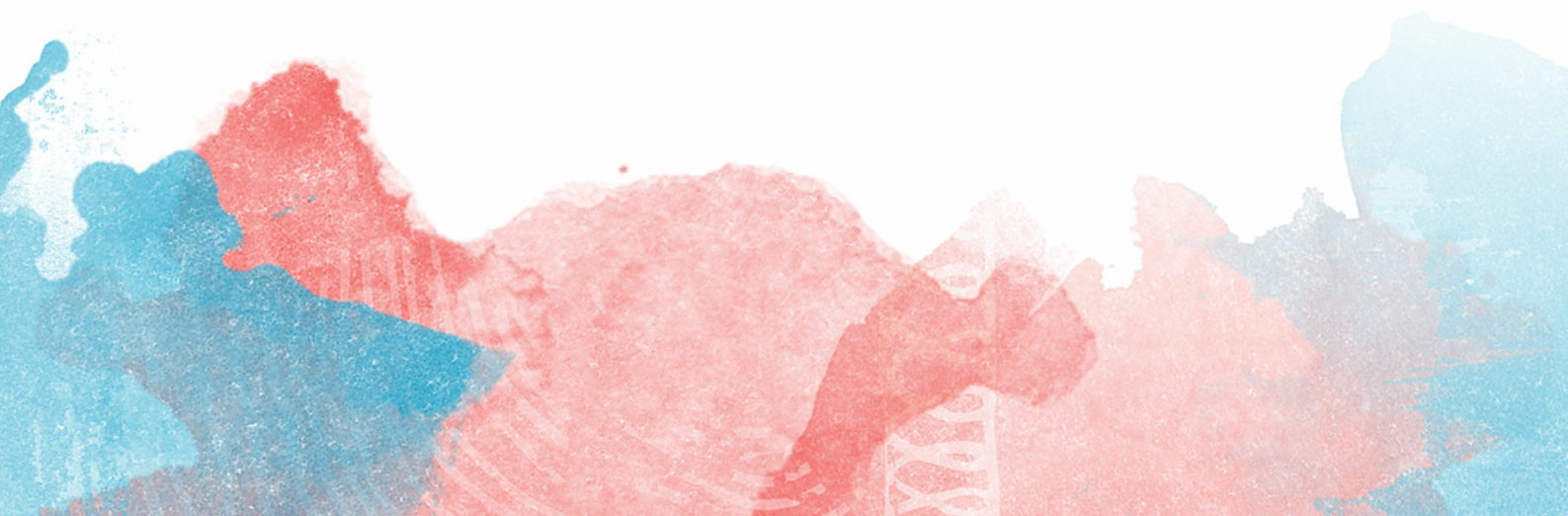
VISION FOR RECONCILIATION

Seaford Secondary College's vision for reconciliation is based on an understanding that accepting and telling the truth about what has happened in the past since colonisation will go a long way in ensuring those wrongs will never be repeated and that racism is eradicated. An emphasis will be placed on valuing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples histories, cultures and acknowledging the positive impact that Kurna people have continued to have on the heritage of the school and its identity. Doing so is imperative to ensure there is a strong relationship between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and non-Indigenous people based on trust and mutual respect.

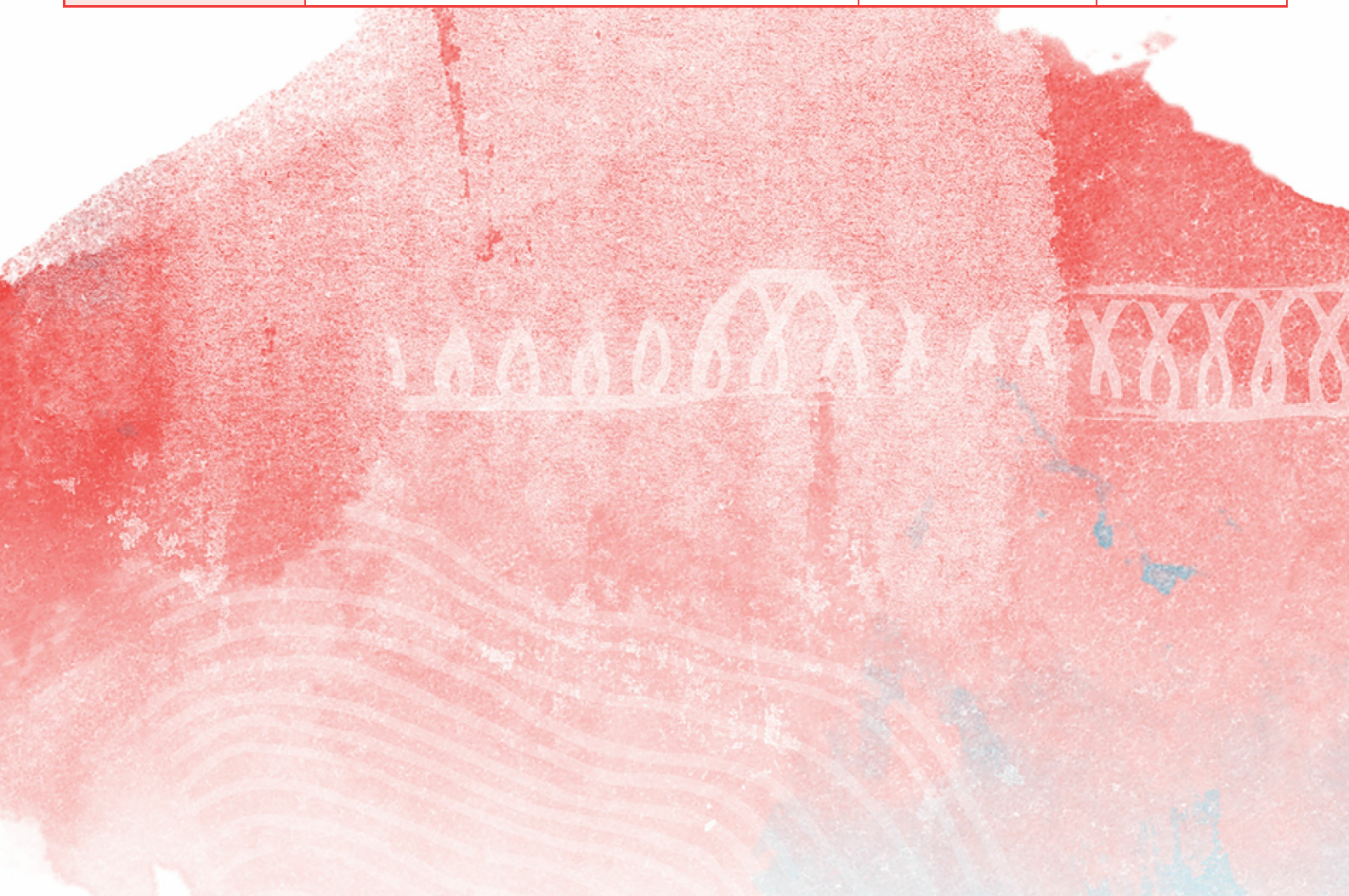
